So if you see your local Lions club on Saturday March 5, make sure you stop and say hello!



We had a few difficulty's with Christmas cakes due to Covid induced labour shortages in the manufacture and transport industries but all was handled with the skills of IPP John Osborne.


The recycling projects, are in full production, Papers and Containers for Cash, are all going well and giving us steady income.

What information do employers need to collect

The employer or workplace operator is required to collect information about a worker's vaccination status and keep a register of this as well as a record that evidence of vaccination has been sighted. A copy of the worker's vaccination certificate or immunisation history only needs to be sighted, it does not need to be stored or filed.

Information about a worker's vaccination status will need to be provided to an authorised officer upon request.

From the Board Meeting 1/02/2022

It is a recommendation from the Board of Directors that all members will need to show their Proof of Vaccinations (once) to the Membership Chairperson who will keep a registry of vaccination details.

BROOKES STORY



It happened just before my 10th birthday, I had just started playing soccer and I was so excited. I had a very sore knee – I saw the doctor and then the physio and I had an X-ray. I went to a specialist at **The Royal Children’s Hospital in Melbourne** and had more scans and a biopsy near my knee. I didn’t understand why they told me to rest and stay off my leg.

My parents knew that I had been diagnosed with Osteosarcoma but didn’t tell me until a few days after my birthday when we went back to the hospital to meet my oncology team. They explained that I was sick and needed medicine but I didn’t understand what they were saying. My mum told me outside that I had cancer and I would lose my hair ... I began to cry.

One week later I was back at hospital to have my port put in, they also tried to put a stomach peg in but they couldn’t. They gave me my first round of chemo. It was horrible as I felt so sick and had to stay in hospital for several days.

After my third round of chemo I started to lose my hair, which made me cry. I had another operation to put my stomach peg in, which was used to feed me overnight as I was hardly eating, and to give me medicine. Every time I had medicine through my mouth I vomited.

The chemo made me very sick, upset and also angry. I would get really bad ulcers in my mouth and high temperatures which meant I would spend more time back in hospital which made me really sad.

I had six rounds of chemo before my surgery, I knew something bad was going to happen but I would block everything out and not talk about it. I knew I was going to lose my leg!

After my surgery they amputated my right leg straight through the knee, I woke up from surgery and had nerve damage in my left leg. It was very painful. I could feel my left foot and half of my leg. I would get sharp stabbing pains which made me scream all night and I didn’t get much sleep.

After my surgery I had 12 more rounds of chemo and another 6 months in and out of hospital. I became really sick again from the chemo, spending more time in hospital. Sometimes I needed blood transfusions. I was also having overnight feeds through my stomach peg.

This was so Yuk! I would wake up in the morning and always vomit. I was having physio but hated it so much because it was so painful! I finished my chemo before Christmas in December 2013.

On Christmas Eve, my oncologist told me I need more operations on my lungs but again I blocked this out and didn’t want to think about it. Early this year I had four more operations at The Royal Children’s Hospital, they took out two more lesions in my lungs, they took out my stomach peg and they also had to close the wound on my stump. I also started having intravenous immunoglobulin treatment every month which is for my nerve damage. I still have this treatment which has helped me so much. I do a lot of physio outside of the hospital. I have a prosthetic leg and I had to learn how to walk ... they are now making me a new leg as I have grown so much.

Every day when I wake up and look at my stump it will always remind me that I had cancer! But I’m a lucky one as I am still here!!!

No medical referrals are required and professional caregivers are also welcomed. The camp attracts participants from across Western Australia and border access permitting, will include participants from inter-state and potentially overseas.

Sponsorship is \$100 per youth or as many as your Club would like to sponsor. Lions National Coordinator for Diabetes, Pat Mills who has advised us that any money we receive for Camp Quokka will be given to the District Treasurer who will look after all monies in the Diabetes Budget under Diabetes Camps for when the camp eventuates. You can sponsor any number of young adults who will go on camp. Will know more after the Council of Governors meet in January when we can go ahead with the camp.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

PRESIDENT

He/she shall be the chief executive officer of the club; preside at all meetings of the board of directors and the club; issue the call for regular meetings and special meetings of the board of directors and the club; appoint the standing and special committees of this club and cooperate with chairpersons to effect regular functioning and reporting of such committees; see that regular elections are duly called, noticed and held; and cooperate with, and be an active member of, the district governor's advisory committee of the zone in which the club is located.

IMMEDIATE PAST PRESIDENT

He/she and the other past presidents shall officially greet members and their guests at club meetings and shall represent this club in welcoming all new service-minded people in the community served by this club.

VICE PRESIDENT(S)

If the president is unable to perform the duties of his/her office for any reason, the vice president next in rank shall occupy his/her position and perform his/her duties with the same authority as the president. Each vice president shall, under the direction of the president, oversee the functioning of such committees of this club as the president shall designate.

SECRETARY

He/she shall be under the supervision and direction of the president and the board of directors and shall act as the liaison officer between the club and the district (single, sub- and multiple) in which this club is located, and the association. In fulfilment of this, he/she shall:

- (1) Submit regular monthly and other reports to the international office of the association on forms provided by the international headquarters containing such information as may be called for by the board of directors of this association.
- (2) Submit to the district governor's cabinet such reports as it may require including copies of regular membership and activities reports.
- (3) Cooperate with and be an active member of the district governor's advisory committee of the zone in which the club is located.
- (4) Have custody and keep and maintain general records of the club, including records of minutes of club and board meetings; attendance; committee appointments; elections; member information, addresses and telephone numbers of members; members club accounts.
- (5) Arrange for issuance, in cooperation with the treasurer, of quarterly or semi-annual statements to each member for dues and other financial obligations owed to this club, collect and turn the same over to the club treasurer and obtain a receipt.
- (6) Give bond for the faithful discharge of his/her office in such sum and with such surety as determined by the board of directors.
- (7) Deliver, in a timely manner, at the conclusion of his/her term in office, the general records of the club to his/her successor in office.

TREASURER He/she shall:

- (1) Receive all monies, from the secretary and otherwise, and deposit the same in a bank or banks recommended by the finance committee and approved by the board of directors.
- (2) Pay out monies in payment of club obligations only on authority given by the board of directors. All checks and vouchers shall be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by one other officer, determined by the board of directors. No two officers authorised as signatories may reside in the same household.
- (3) Have custody and keep and maintain general records of club receipts and disbursements.
- (4) Prepare and submit monthly and semi-annual financial reports to the board of directors of this club.
- (5) Give bond for the faithful discharge of his/her office in such sum and with such surety as determined by the board of directors.
- (6) Deliver, in a timely manner, at the conclusion of his/her term in office, the financial accounts, funds and records of the club to his/her successor in office.

MEMBERSHIP DIRECTOR

The membership director shall be the chairperson of the membership committee. The responsibilities for this position shall be:

- (1) Development of a growth program specifically for the club and presented to the board of directors for approval.
- (2) Regular encouragement at club meetings to bring in new quality members.
- (3) Ensuring implementation of proper recruitment and retention procedures.
- (4) Preparation and implementation of orientation sessions.
- (5) Reporting to the board of directors on ways to reduce the loss of members.
- (6) Coordination with other club committees in fulfilling these responsibilities.
- (7) Serving as a member of the zone level membership committee.

LION TAMER *(Optional)*

The Lion Tamer shall have charge of and be responsible for the property and paraphernalia of the club, including flags, banners, gong, gavel, song books and button board. He/she shall put each in its proper place before each meeting and return the same to the proper storage area after each meeting. He/she shall act as sergeant-at-arms at meetings, see that those present are properly seated, and distribute bulletins, favours and literature as required at club and board meetings. He/she shall give special attention to assure that each new member sits with a different group at each meeting so that he/she can become better acquainted.

TAIL TWISTER *(Optional)*

He/she shall promote harmony, good fellowship, life and enthusiasm in the meetings through appropriate stunts and games and the judicious imposition of fines on club members. There shall be no ruling from his/her decision in imposing a fine, provided, however, that no fine shall exceed an amount fixed by the board of directors of this club, and no member shall be fined more than twice at any one meeting. The tail twister (optional) may not be fined except by the unanimous vote of all members present. All monies collected by the tail twister (optional) shall be immediately turned over to the treasurer and a receipt be given.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The board of directors shall have the following duties and powers:

- (1) It is the executive board of the club and is responsible for the execution, through the club officers, of the policies approved by the club. All new business and policy of the club shall be considered and shaped, first, by the board of directors for presentation to and approval by the club members at a regular or special club meeting.
- (2) It authorises all expenditures and shall not create any indebtedness beyond the current income of this club, nor authorise disbursement of club funds for purposes inconsistent with the business and policy authorised by the club membership.
- (3) It has the power to modify, override or rescind the action of any officer of the club.
- (4) It ensures that the books, accounts and operations of the club are audited annually or, at its discretion, more frequently and may require an accounting or have an audit made of the handling of any club funds by any officer, committee or member of the club. Any member of the club in good standing may inspect the audit or accounting upon request at a reasonable time and place.
- (5) It appoints, on recommendation of the finance committee, a bank or banks for the deposit of the funds of the club.
- (6) It appoints the surety for the bonding (insurance) of any officer of the club.
- (7) It does not authorise, nor permit, the expenditure, for any administrative purpose, of the net income of projects or activities of the club by which funds are raised from the public. It shall submit all matters of new business and policy to the respective standing or special club committee for study and recommendation to the board.
- (8) It appoints, subject to approval of the club membership, the delegates and alternates of the club to district (single, sub- or multiple) and international conventions.
- (9) It maintains at least two (2) separate funds governed by generally accepted accounting practices. The first fund to record administrative monies such as dues, tail twisting fines and other internally raised club funds. A second fund is to be established to record activity or public welfare monies raised by asking support from the public. Disbursement from such funds is to be in strict compliance with item (7) above.

"Are you certain?" Abe asks again. "I just can't believe there are no Mexican Jews!"


"Senor, I ask EVERYONE," replies the exasperated waiter.

PDG GARRY IRVINE, RECEIVES THE IAN M. STOCKDALE, HUMANITARIAN AWARD.



On the 30th November 2021 PDG Garry Irvine was presented the Ian M. Stockdale humanitarian award by the Chairman of the Lions Cancer Institute Phil Chinnery for his 50 year continuous service with the Lions Cancer Institute. Before the presentation PDG Garry was introduced by PDG Neil Saunders, this is part of his address;

Normally when we introduce “One of our Own” we go through their previous achievements and service in Lions.

If I even attempted to summarise Garry’s life as a Lion, we would be here all night.

Suffice to say, after 50 years of continuous service, there are a lot of memorable achievements in his Lion’s Life.

One that deserves special mention is that in 1978, when he was appointed District Governor of District 201 W2, he was only the second to fulfil this role in what was a fledgling District in Western Australia. As impressive as his Lions Clubs involvements are, his contribution to the Lions Cancer Institute is also a record that has a long history.

Garry will, no doubt, present you with the early history of the Institute, but he will probably not mention that he has been a member of the Board of Directors for most of that period, Chairman of the Board for over six years, has studied and passed the online Dermoscopy course that allows him to screen people for suspect skin lesions, is a vehicle driver, administrator and currently Public Relations, NZ Liaison and Business Development Director.



IAN M. STOCKDALE, HUMANITARIAN AWARD.

Ian Stockdale was one of the most popular and respected members of our organisation. He was a true Christian gentleman who devoted his life to ensuring a bright future for others. In 1941 Ian enlisted and served in New Guinea with the AIF and spent months in a Repatriation Hospital before returning to the real estate business. He married Lions Lady Rae in 1946 and, following travels to the USA where youth camps were commonplace; his love and concern for children and their future become one of his strong characteristics. Ian served as District Governor of District 201M in 1969–70, as International Director from 1976 to 1978, and was awarded one of the Association's highest awards, The Ambassador of Goodwill. In 1979 he was awarded the MBE.

One of his biggest legacies is the Lions Licola Village.

Licola is a small and attractive village beside the Macalister River, 254 kilometres east of Melbourne.

The township of Licola is owned entirely by the Lions Clubs of Victoria and Southern New South Wales. It is the only privately owned town in Victoria and the only one not on mains power.

The town generates its own power, pumps, and treats its own water and is also responsible for its waste management.

The greater part of the town is occupied by the Licola Wilderness Village, where Lions Clubs have, for 50 years, run camps for disadvantaged and deserving children and special needs groups, mostly held during the school holidays. In addition to this, they are also open to small & large public groups.

It was created from Ian's ability to clearly visualise an opportunity and was purchased and converted to the facility as we know it today through his untiring work for the youth of the nation.

In honour of his work, the Australian Lions Foundation has instituted the Ian M Stockdale Humanitarian Award.
