Grilled Basa served with a lemon lime Cream Sauce

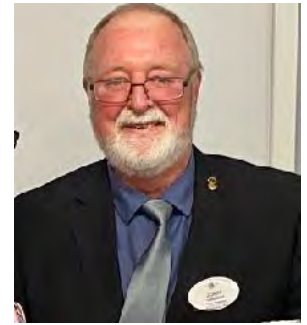

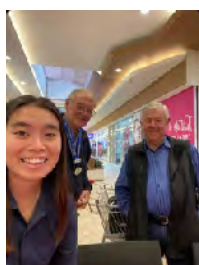

Darren is married with two adult children and had eighteen years in Audio production before a trip to Cambodia changed everything. Since then he has had eight years with World Vision, six years with the Salvation Army and fifteen months now, with his passion, **Destiny Rescue**.

Destiny Rescue's **mission** is to rescue children from sexual exploitation and human trafficking and help them stay free and their aim is to rescue as many children as possible and help them stay free.

Darren highlighted some startling facts about Children sexual exploitation:

- More than 1 million children are exploited each year in the commercial sex trade.
- 73% of children trafficked are from the Asia Pacific region.
- 15 years is the average of a child Trafficked into sexual slavery.
- 99 Billion is generated by sex traffickers every single year.

Darren then described the different types of rescues according to situations and vulnerabilities of the child:

COVERT, where rescue agents go undercover into a sex establishments like Brothels, Massage Parlours etc.

RAID where rescue workers identify underage victims and gather intelligence for a planned rescue with the Local and Federal law enforcement agencies.

BORDER, where rescue agents are located at border crossing station, identifying vulnerable trafficking victims.

INTERVENTIONAL where rescue agents receive intelligence about a potential trafficking situation and intervene to prevent sexual exploitation.

The areas that Destiny rescue is actively working are Cambodia, Dominican Republic, Nepal, The Philippines, Thailand, Uganda and undisclosed. 27 rescued in Nepal

One **rescue was in Nepal** where 27 were rescued, among those rescued were nine children ages 13 to 17, a mother and her toddler as well as a 22-year-old man.

Our agents rescued girls as young as 13 years old who were being lured across the border by traffickers promising marriage, jobs or shopping opportunities.

Our team assisted in the rescue of a 22-year-old man from labor trafficking and provided him with counselling before reuniting him with his family.

Once the children have been rescued then the immediate process of helping them stay free by reuniting them with their families if safe to do so or they are housed in a Destiny Rescue home, partner referred home or a government assigned shelter or home. When we are involved in Reintegration our team develops an individualised path to freedom by providing urgent health care, temporary monetary assistance, Educational / Vocational training, emotional help and job placement.

Introducing Chirawan*

Chirawan's father was an alcoholic and incapable of providing for his family. Without food or clothing, his teenage daughter desperately sought income for her survival.

Vulnerable and searching for hope, she was quickly exploited by someone she thought she could trust.

Understanding Cultural Norms

Taken to a bar in the city, Chirawan was sold repeatedly to customers seeking sexual gratification. Left feeling worthless and without any other option to generate income, Chirawan resigned herself to her fate.

In Thailand, daughters feel the weight of responsibility to support their family financially. Village life, particularly for hill tribes, is rife with poverty, and girls go to cities to find work and send money home.

Unfortunately, these girls often have limited employment options and lack education, work experience and even citizenship. The entertainment industry, however, opens its arms to their naivety and trust.

This strong economic pull can compel girls to enter an environment that seems fortuitous but often turns dark as the reality of hidden expectations emerges. For example, girls often accept employment at bars after landing a role as "a waitress".

But these bars demand girls dress provocatively, serve drinks and sit with male customers.

It doesn't take long for exploitation to happen to girls working in these places. Customers typically touch girls inappropriately and will solicit them for sex. Then, the men will take the child off the property or into back rooms after paying the bar's owner: a pimp or mamasan. While the girls may be experiencing hell on earth, they can be too afraid to return home or disclose their actual situation, fearing they will cast shame on their family or community for being a "former prostitute."

There is Hope - Life Update on Chirawan

Two undercover Destiny Rescue agents found Chirawan in the bar. They offered her a way out of her misery.

"I want to thank them for establishing this project to help people like me, helping my family and giving me a better life," she said.

Her dream is to go into business. Chirawan is currently working in a kitchen, continuing her studies, and saving her wages to enable her to launch her own venture.

"I now value myself more, and getting out of that job made me never want to go back again," she said. "In the future, I hope my life will get better and better."

From the Frontlines: Zimbabwe

Incredible stories are coming in from our new country launch, Zimbabwe! These quotes from survivors and caseworkers offer an inside look at the positive transformations taking place.

Many of the children we rescue in East and Southern Africa have been driven to exploitation to survive. The layered hardships they face, such as child-run families, extreme poverty and lack of access to education, do not evaporate after rescue. That's why our programs in these regions provide customised care for survivors after rescue.

By walking with a child and her family and providing targeted services after rescue, we can specifically address the vulnerabilities that led to her exploitation and provide opportunities to help her stay free.

During the pilot phase alone, our program in Zimbabwe served over 100 children. The impact can be seen in survivors' confident smiles and heard in their words.

Finals of the Youth of the Year and Leo of the Year competitions took place, providing great entertainment and food for thought for Conventioneers and judges alike.

With Lions Australia's recent announcement of the Big Audacious Mission (BAM) to build membership to 30,000 by 2030 and 50,000 by 2050, the Leos and Youth of the Year programs have never been more important.

Leos

The Leo of the Year program offers young people the opportunity to share and celebrate their passion and commitment to community service, and a platform to voice their opinions on topics close to their heart.

The 4 finalists each presented a five-minute speech on topics ranging from community service to outfits.

NSW's Georgia Bailey, QLD's Molly Gysberts, VIC's Clarissa Wong, and WA's Luke Tammen all presented wonderful speeches.

Luke Tammen won the Public Speaking Award while Georgia Bailey was announced as the 2023 Leo of the Year.

On the other hand, the Youth of the Program encourages and fosters leadership skills in students nearing the end of their schooling years, hoping to bring forth the next generation of outstanding young Australians.

"The experiences and life skills gained by achieving this level of the challenge will, very often, give encouragement to take on projects which may have been considered unattainable," he said.

The final of the 2023 Youth of the Year competition took place on Monday, May 1st. The competition looks at competitors' leadership, sporting and cultural awareness, personality and general knowledge, as well as public speaking.

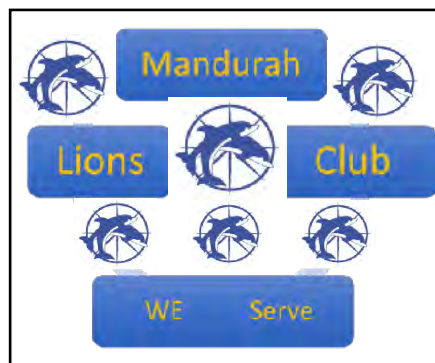
