AMBER IMPRESSES WITH HER TALK ON XYY SYNDROME

Until last Tuesday's dinner meeting, I had no idea that there was a condition known as XYY Syndrome (Jacobs Syndrome). Our guest speaker Amber Gilkes was able to tell us of her experience with her son who has XYY syndrome. It is estimated that 1800 males in Western Australia may be affected with XYY syndrome. What Amber discovered is that there is little or no support for those families for the families who have a child with the syndrome. Amber is trying to change that and is working to spread support and information to those dealing with the XYY Syndrome. Lion Peter and I met with Amber on Monday to find out what her vision is to help those with XYY syndrome. Her initial goal is to raise awareness of the condition and have it recognised by such bodies as the NDIS. What Amber has discovered is that there is no organisation that provides support for XYY syndrome in Western Australia, Australia or the World.

We talked with Amber about Lions and what Lions may be able to do for her in achieving her vision. We asked Amber to consider her fledgling committee joining the Lions organisation through forming a special interest Branch Club. Hopefully there will be more on that later.

I know as a club we were moved by Ambers talk; however, Amber was also moved by the warmth and friendship that was shown by all members. She commented sincerely on the fact that everyone came up to say a friendly hello. A unique experience for her.

Now here is the interesting thing, how did Amber get to speak to us? It all to do with Lions Mints. , Amber was with her mum doing some banking at the Bendigo Bank. Lion Gordon was also at the bank attending to his Mints. Gordon was approached by Ambers Mum and as a result we were introduced to XYY Syndrome and the Lakelands Community Gardens.

The Lions Cancer Institute conducted a free Skin Screening Clinic on behalf of the Mandurah Club. 82 people were screened on the day by the Volunteer Screening team of Dr Alan Wright, Dr Jessica Huynh and Dermoscopists Diane Wright.

RESULTS FROM SCREENING

The Lions Cancer Institute

82 people were screened, at free Skin Screening clinic

The Lions Cancer Institute travelled to Mandurah on Saturday to conduct a free Skin Screening clinic. The Lions club organised the clinic and it was held at their facility in Park Road. The Lions Cancer Institute Screenings are conducted with the assistance of Volunteer Screening personal. On Saturday our screening volunteers were Dr Alan Wright, Dr Jessica Huyhn and Sr Diane Wright.

82 people were screened, on the day, with 18 (22%) having suspicious Lesions identified and were referred to their GP for further investigation. 9 of the suspect lesions were considered to be life threatening if left to develop unchecked. 28 people were screened for the first time and for 40 people it was more than 1 year since being screened.

GUEST SPEAKER

AMBER GILKES - The XYY Syndrome Association

XYY syndrome is a rare chromosomal disorder that affects males. It is caused by the presence of an extra Y chromosome. Males normally have one X and one Y chromosome. However, individuals with this syndrome have, one X and two Y chromosomes. Affected individuals are usually very tall and many experience severe acne during adolescence. Additional symptoms may include, learning disabilities and behavioural problems, such as impulsivity. Intelligence is usually in the normal range, although IQ is on average 10-15 points lower than siblings.

The Common Traits

Traits vary widely among males with XYY Syndrome.

Developmental delay.

Low muscle tone.

Emotional Dysregulation

Executive functioning

Speech and language delay

Behavioural difficulties

Impulse control

Inattention

Sensory Processing Disorder.

Underdeveloped social skills.

Most males with XYY Syndrome are undiagnosed until later in life. Some males will live completely normal lives with this syndrome.

However some males require higher levels of support. Early diagnosis of the XYY Syndrome is very important so as the correct support networks can be diagnosed and put in place. Treatment may include speech therapy or extra help with schoolwork, but outcomes are generally good. The condition occurs in about 1 in 1,000 male births. Many people with the condition are unaware that they have it. The condition was first described in 1961.

Jack nodded his head, "that's fine with me, can I take him for a test run?"


Jack was having the time of his life this horse sure could run he thought to himself.

September is Child Cancer Awareness Month

The problem of childhood cancer in Australia

Cancer is the most common cause of disease related death in Australian children. Every year, more than 950 children and adolescents are diagnosed with cancers, and nearly three will die from cancer every week. While 60 years ago cancer was a death sentence, and today 8 out of 10 children survive thanks to medical research, some cure rates for many childhood cancers have not improved significantly over this time. Additionally, at any one time in Australia, over 2000 children, adolescents and young adults are on active treatment for cancer, or at risk of relapse – and in most cases, the treatments used are general, non-targeted, cytotoxic drugs that are highly toxic to normal and cancer tissues alike. The side effects from their treatment can be serious and lifelong.

Lions District 201W2 Service Bulletin August 2020 “We Serve”



To say we are living in challenging times is a considerable understatement. 2020 has been a disastrous year on a scale few of us have ever witnessed before and we will be living with its legacy for quite some time to come. Virtually all endeavours, including that of Lions Clubs, came to a screeching halt in March and the stress that has put on our membership has already been well noted. However, as they say, in every crisis there is opportunity and the steep rise in the need for community services is one that we cannot ignore. It gives us ever more reason to reaffirm our commitment to our motto – “We Serve”.

Many of our Clubs in W2 are currently reactivating their service programs and are seeking ways to cope with the few COVID-19 restrictions we still have in WA but which could be revisited should we see a resurgence of infections. Those Districts less fortunate than our own are having to once again dig deep to find ways to serve and remain active. Our Multiple Districts GST Coordinator John Muller has released a considerable range of information to help clubs with ideas for operating under these difficult times and I will be sending those out to Clubs in the near future.

However, as you will hear from our District Governor Dot Jacobs and her team this year, there are three major service initiatives we are encouraging all clubs to add to their service programs. These activities are designed to drive our organisation forward in service and to meet some of our most urgent challenges – ones that not only affect us on a personal level but also have truly global impact.

CARING FOR THE ELDERLY

We have all seen reports of critical gaps emerging in the care and nurturing of our older and disadvantaged citizens whether it be through loneliness, disability, mental health or any of afflictions suffered by our aged population. This has become even more critical since the rise of COVID-19 which has forced so many of these folks into extreme isolation. Many clubs are already doing acts of kindness in this area but this initiative, sponsored by our MD Council of Governors, seeks to encourage all clubs to explore ways they can extend this into their own communities.

DIABETES AWARENESS

Last year, Lions Clubs across Australia held a ‘Lap the Map’ activity in support of Diabetes Awareness, one of our 5 Global Causes. It was very successful for those Clubs who participated and so this year, we are encouraging all Clubs to undertake an activity that can contribute to the Lap the Map program. This would be held on (or around) November 14th during National Diabetes Week. Why diabetes when we have this COVID-19 pandemic to worry about?

At the time of writing this bulletin, the coronavirus pandemic has affected 18M people and taken nearly 700,000 lives across the globe. It is an extremely harmful and acute threat to our species. However, the pandemic is not expected to last indefinitely as researchers race to develop a vaccine or more effective anti-viral drugs.

The number of people diagnosed with diabetes world-wide rose from 108M to 422M between 1980 and 2014 and was directly responsible for 1.6M deaths in 2016. In 2014, 8.7% of the global population over 18 years of age had diabetes. By 2045, the number of people with diabetes is expected to rise to 700M. This is a chronic threat of the highest magnitude and it shows no signs of slowing down. It too deserves our urgent attention. Australian Lions can best assist by undertaking efforts to spread awareness of its symptoms and of treatment. Lap the Map provides us with the vehicle to do this in our communities.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS



Arguably, the degradation of our environment is a greater threat to our species. It is truly a global emergency that affects us all and will have devastating consequences on the generations to come unless we act with purpose and haste. We are being asked as Clubs and Districts to undertake environmental projects that will help alleviate the impact of the changes that are occurring to our climate and to the degradation of our environment. Again, many Clubs are already undertaking small environmental projects but we need much more. There is no reason why each and every one of our 62 Clubs cannot be collecting recyclables, planting a tree, cleaning up a stream, river, lake or dam or conducting a program to encourage a plastic free street, suburb or town.

As your District Services Coordinator for 2020/21, I will be sending out more details of these projects to your Clubs in the very near future. These will be delivered to Clubs by email and through the District newsletter but it would really help if each Club could nominate a 'Club Service Chairperson' I can send information to directly. This doesn't need to be a separate position for someone – it can be combined with an existing position such a 2VP. The role is not important but the tasks are.

In addition, I am always available for a call or email on any matters to do with your service programs.



Through a unique venue QR code, SafeWA supports efficient COVID-19 contact tracing, should it be necessary, by providing a digital register of contact details for patrons attending venues.

The digital register was developed exclusively for WA Health and is provided at no cost to WA venue operators or the public, as part of mandatory requirements to maintain a contact register, and is an extra precautionary measure in line with COVID safe principles.
